

You Always Have The Poor

About a week before Jesus was arrested and executed, he was with his disciples at the house of his friends Mary, Martha and Lazarus. (See John 12:1-8 for the story.) While at the dinner, Mary took some really expensive, really fragrant perfume/ointment and bathed Jesus' feet, and then wiped them clean with her hair. The whole house was bursting with the fragrance of the ointment. Judas Iscariot had a problem with this episode. He suggested that it would've been better to sell the ointment (it was really expensive, after all) and then give the proceeds to the poor. That is a very noble suggestion. In fact, that is a great question: why didn't they sell it and give the money to the poor? Did I mention that it was really expensive? Imagine the positive impact that could have had. Judas' true motivation was described explicitly—he cared nothing for the poor but instead was the keeper of the purse for the party and regularly stole from it. With all this revealed to us, Jesus explained that Mary bought it for the day of his own burial, and then said something that is guite peculiar: "You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."

I have been paying close attention to how Christians are portraying themselves in today's society. I get the feeling that today's Christians, in general, are primarily concerned with their relationship with Jesus; that is the most important thing, after all. Right? And, I feel that this peculiar statement by Jesus, "you always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me," is interpreted to say, "See! I told you! You have to prioritize your relationship with Jesus over everything and everyone else!" Well, yes. Your relationship with Jesus is incredibly important, but that's not what Jesus is saying. In fact, and here's the rub, Jesus is not talking to me and to you—Jesus is talking to Judas. He is telling Judas to leave Mary alone. He is telling Judas that Mary spent her money wisely. Jesus knows Mary and knows that she is concerned about the poor and is compassionate (loves) the poor and destitute. Jesus also knows Judas, and

knows that his love of money vastly overshadows his compassion (love) for the poor and destitute.

Back to you and me and to Christians today. While our relationship with Jesus is important, our love (compassion) for each other and for the poor and destitute is *equally* as important—that's right, "*equally*." At another dinner (John 13:1-35), Judas walked out right before Jesus emphasized the point I just made when he said, "I give you a new commandment, that you love (compassion) one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." Judas missed that point. Today's Christian cannot.

Soon we will celebrate the birth of the Savior of the world. His coming is for the salvation (wholeness and well-being) of the whole world . . . the . . . whole . . . world.
